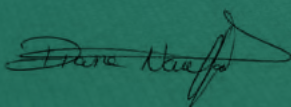

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GENERAL INFORMATION

ABOUT THE INSTITUTION

◆ History and Location

LAU, a leading private higher education institution in Lebanon, operates under a charter from the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York. The institution is accredited by the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE).

LAU is a nonsectarian institution guided by deeply rooted shared ethical values. It started as a women's college in 1924, with origins dating back to 1835, when the Ottoman Empire's first school for girls was established. LAU expanded over the decades, catering to the growing educational needs of Lebanon, the Middle East, and beyond. Today, LAU boasts seven schools and 21 centers and institutes. Dynamic and distinguished faculty members conduct research and teach in a wide range of academic disciplines.

LAU's two main campuses are located on lush hillsides near the Mediterranean Sea, around 43 kilometers apart, making it accessible from all areas of Lebanon. The Byblos and Beirut campuses offer similarly structured programs in the arts, sciences, and business. Nursing and medicine programs are offered exclusively on the Byblos campus as well as junior and senior-year courses in engineering and pharmacy.

LAU continues its journey of improvement and advancement, with the establishment of its New York Headquarters and Academic Center and a new executive center in Beirut's Central District.

◆ Accreditation

LAU is accredited by **NECHE**, formerly the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Inc.

◆ Academic Schools and Colleges

LAU comprises seven schools: The School of Architecture and Design, the School of Arts and Sciences, the Adnan Kassar School of Business, the School of Engineering, the Gilbert and Rose-Marie Chagoury School of Medicine, the Alice Ramez Chagoury School of Nursing, and the School of Pharmacy.

◆ Academic Programs and Degrees Conferred

LAU offers 66 degree programs including 34 bachelor's degree programs, 19 master's degree programs, six online master's degree programs, two professional degree programs, three online graduate certificates, and two post-bachelor's certificates.



During the Academic Year 2023-2024, LAU awarded 1,607 bachelor's degrees, 284 master's degrees, 98 doctoral/professional practice degrees, 21 post-bachelor's degree certificates, and two certificate program degrees.

◆ Faculty

In fall 2024, full-time faculty totaled 439, including 50 professors, 138 associate professors, and 159 assistant professors. Additionally, 87 percent of LAU's full-time faculty hold a doctorate or terminal degree.

◆ Enrollment

In fall 2024, enrollments totaled 9,084, including 7,809 undergraduates, 1,000 graduates, and 275 students in doctoral/professional practice degree programs. Of the 8,080 full-time students, 93 percent were undergraduates, four percent were graduates, and three percent were enrolled in doctoral/professional practice degree programs. Males constituted 49 percent of the undergraduate student body while the total number of enrollments included 1,055 students from 70 foreign countries.

◆ Admissions / Retention

In fall 2024, 2,239 undergraduate students were enrolled at LAU, with 44 percent of all first-time applicants enrolled. Additionally, 4,554 or 96 percent of accepted first-time students attended schools in Lebanon. LAU accepted 571 or 63 percent of graduate applicants, while 56 percent enrolled in fall 2024. Of the students in doctoral/professional practice degree programs, 178 or 51 percent were accepted, and 56 percent enrolled in the academic year 2024-2025.

◆ Finance

LAU's operating budget for 2023-2024 was \$212,232,578, marking a five percent increase from the 2022-2023 budget. The increase reflects the university's careful expenditure policy on growth and expansion, especially during Lebanon's economic crisis and COVID-19 pandemic. LAU earmarked 43 percent of its budget for student financial aid.

◆ Physical Facilities

LAU campuses occupy 345,143 square meters of space, of which the Beirut campus represents 27,500 square meters and the Byblos campus 317,643 square meters. The University is also a major shareholder in the LAU Medical Center-Rizk Hospital and the LAU Medical Center-Saint John's Hospital.

CHARTER AND ACCREDITATION

CHARTER

LAU is chartered by the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York. The University of the State of New York is the only entity authorized by the State of New York to incorporate higher education institutions and allow them to confer degrees.

In 1950, the Board of Regents granted the Beirut College for Women—now LAU—a provisional charter and an absolute charter five years later. Since then, the charter has been amended several times in response to the institution's growth.

The University of the State of New York is a broad system of educational services that includes thousands of schools, colleges, universities, museums, libraries, and other institutions. Its Board of Regents sets the overall education policy for the State of New York and appoints a commissioner of education, who serves as, who serves as president of the University of the State of New York and heads the New York State Education Department.

ACCREDITATION

Degrees awarded by LAU are registered at the Lebanese Ministry of Education and Higher Education (MEHE) and the Board of Education in the State of New York.

INSTITUTIONAL ACCREDITATION

LAU is accredited by the **New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE)**, formerly the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Inc.





PROGRAM ACCREDITATION

1 School of Architecture and Design

◆ Bachelor of Architecture

The Bachelor of Architecture degree is officially recognized by the Lebanese Ministry of Education and Higher Education, which entitles its holder to register in the Order of Engineers & Architects in Lebanon. In addition, the B. Arch program has been granted initial accreditation as of 2019 by the National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB), which accredits architecture programs in the United States. Following that, the program was revisited in March 2023 and was granted continuing accreditation for an 8-year term, effective as of January 2023. The program is the first in Lebanon and the third outside the United States to receive NAAB accreditation: <https://www.naab.org/>.

The Bachelor of Architecture degree is also officially recognized as equivalent to the Diplôme d'Etat d'Architecte (DEA) by the Ministry of Culture in France.

◆ Design Programs

The School of Architecture & Design at LAU earned the National Association of Schools of Art & Design (NASAD) Accreditation in 2020. The NASAD accreditation covers the BFA in Studio Arts, the BFA in Interior Design, the BFA in Graphic Design, and the BFA in Fashion Design, and the Master in Islamic Art. On July 12, 2023, the Association for Evaluation and Accreditation of Medical Education Programs (TEPDAD/ Turkey), a World Federation for Medical Education-recognized accreditation agency, officially awarded LAU's undergraduate medical program (MD) full accreditation until August 31, 2027. This accreditation comes after the program had previously received a two-year provisional accreditation in the summer of 2021, pending an onsite visit.

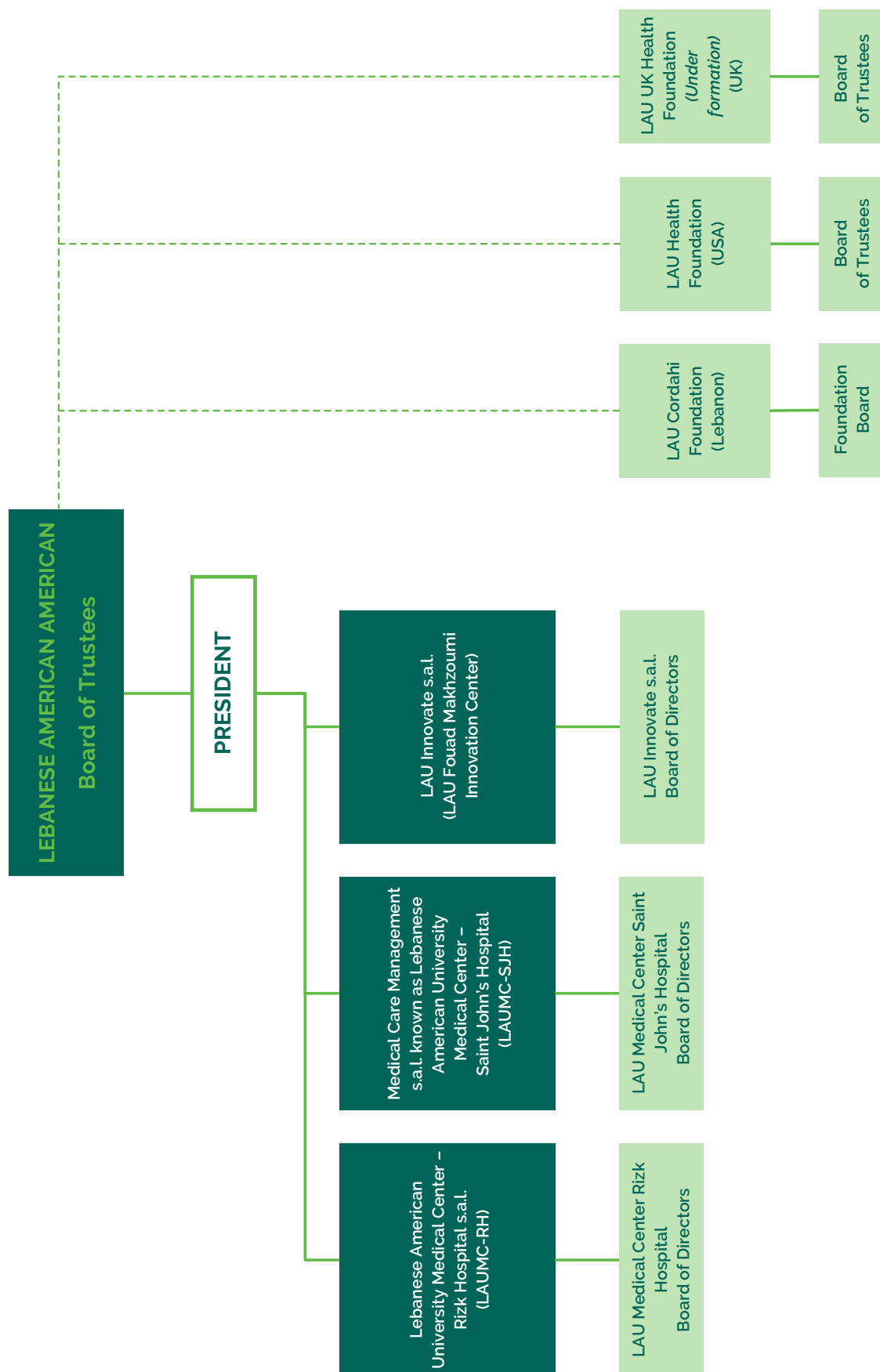

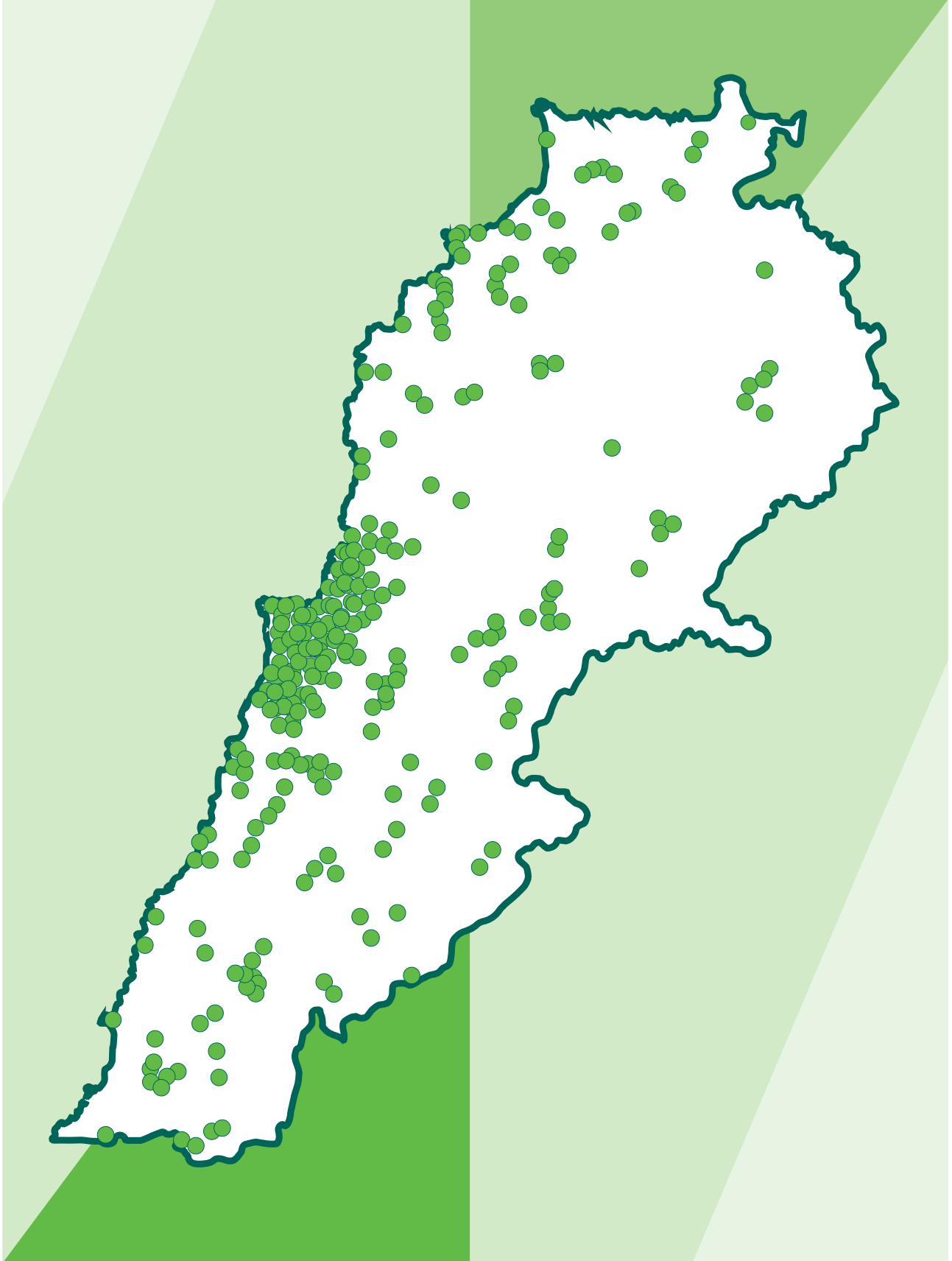

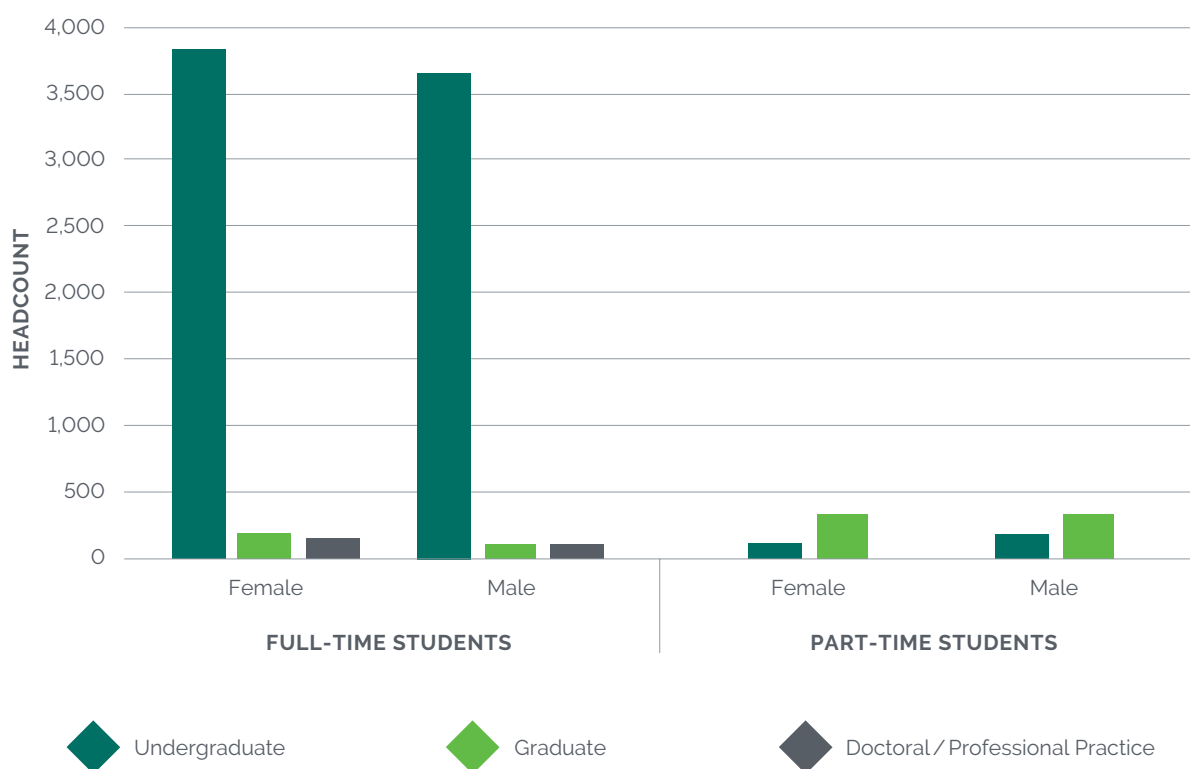

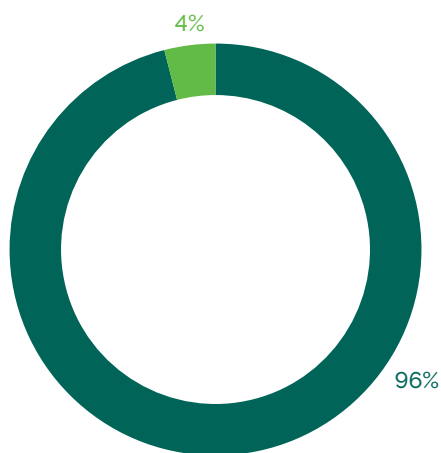

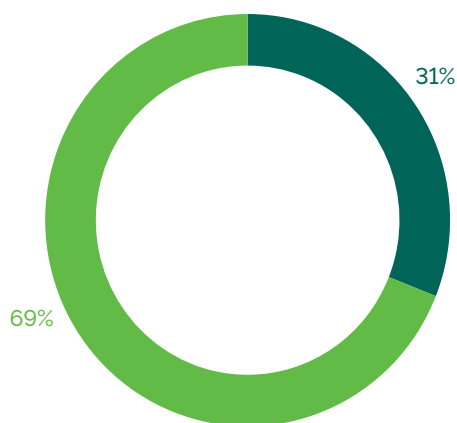

Graduate FTE Enrollment



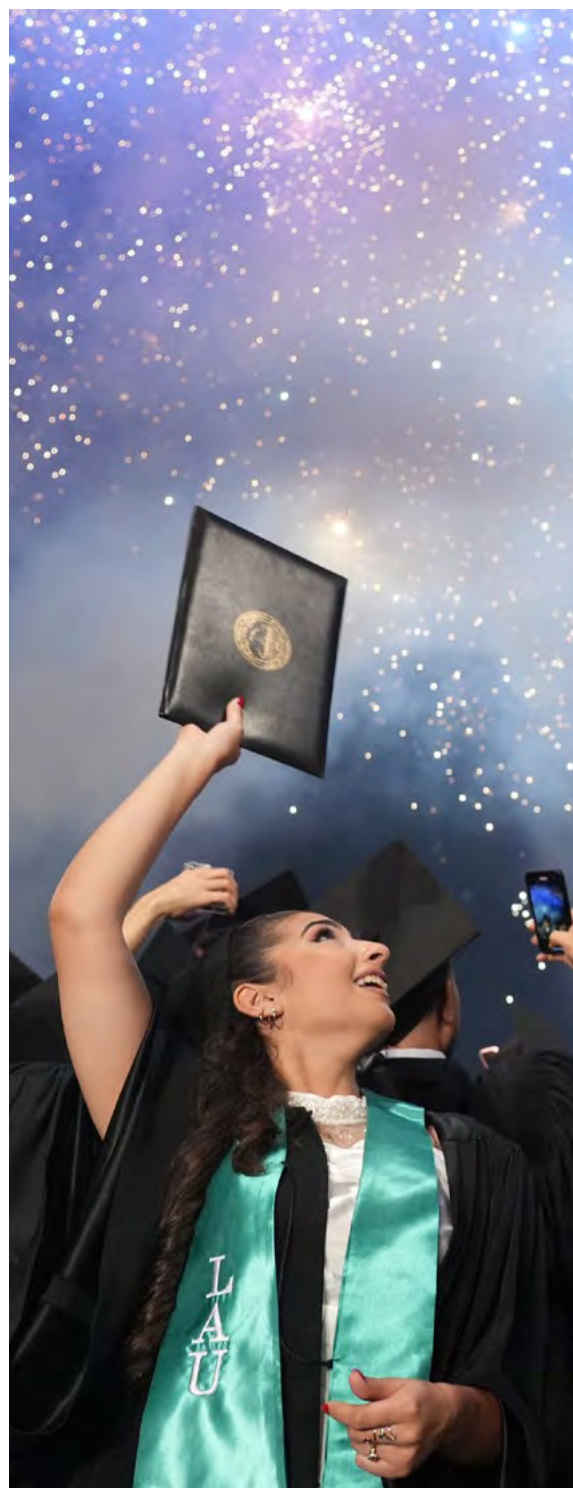

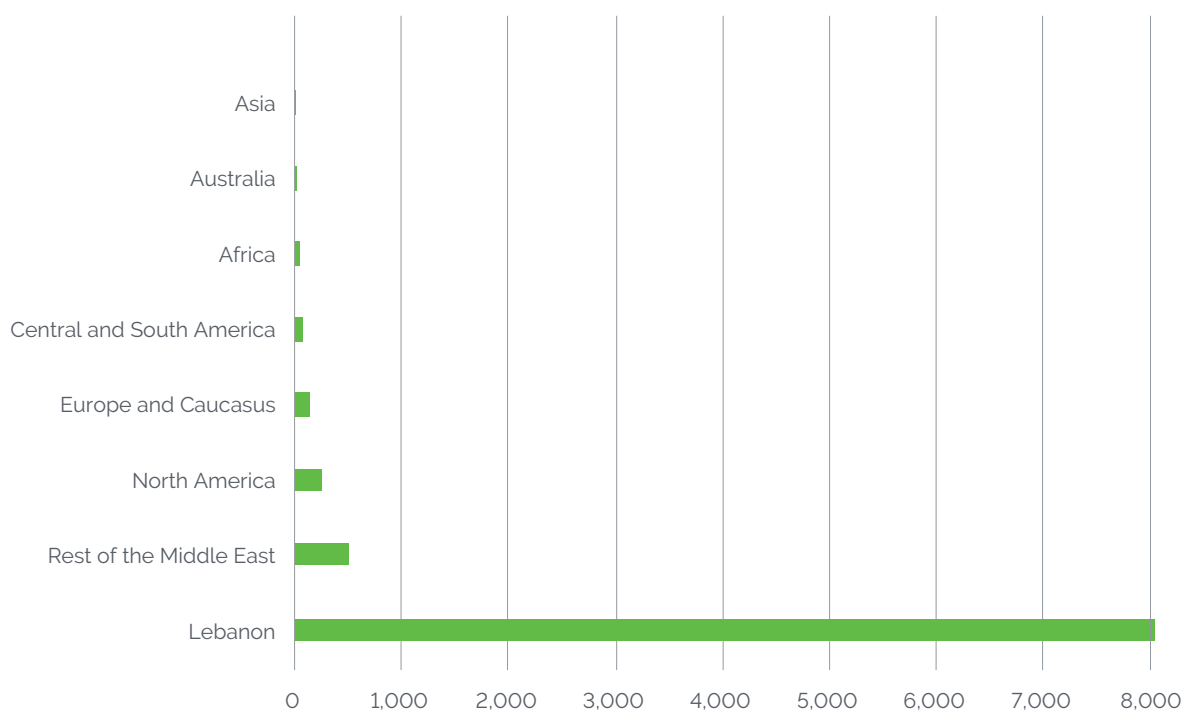

Enrollment by Place of Origin

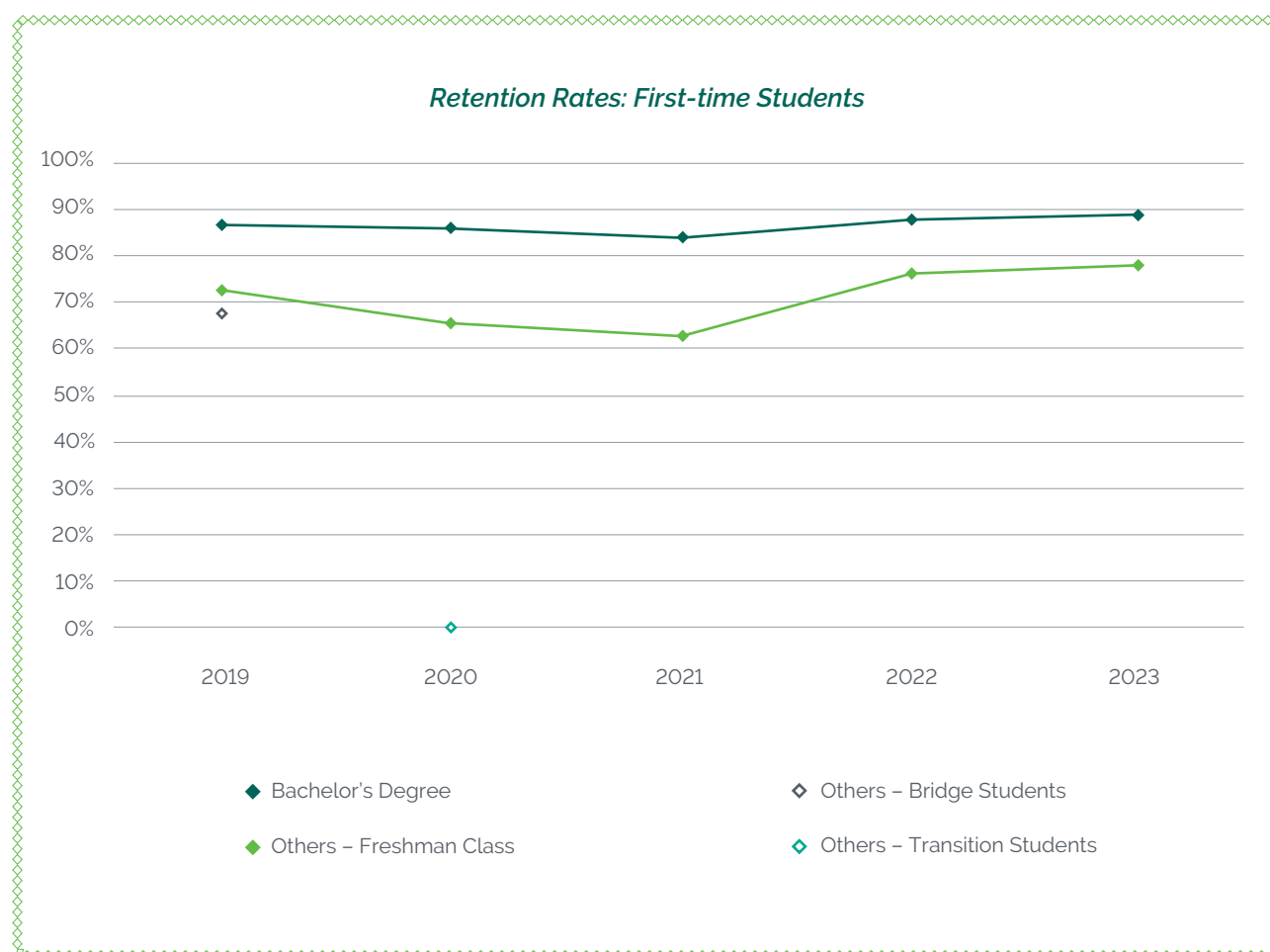

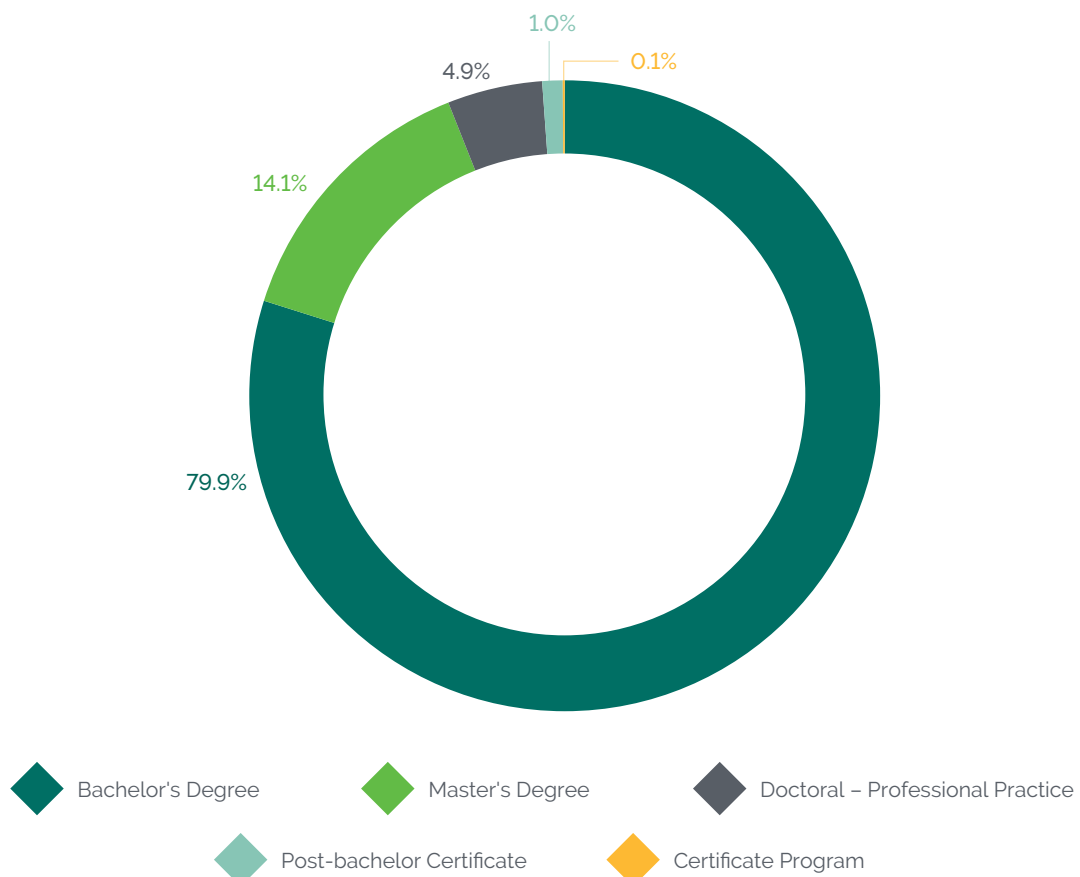

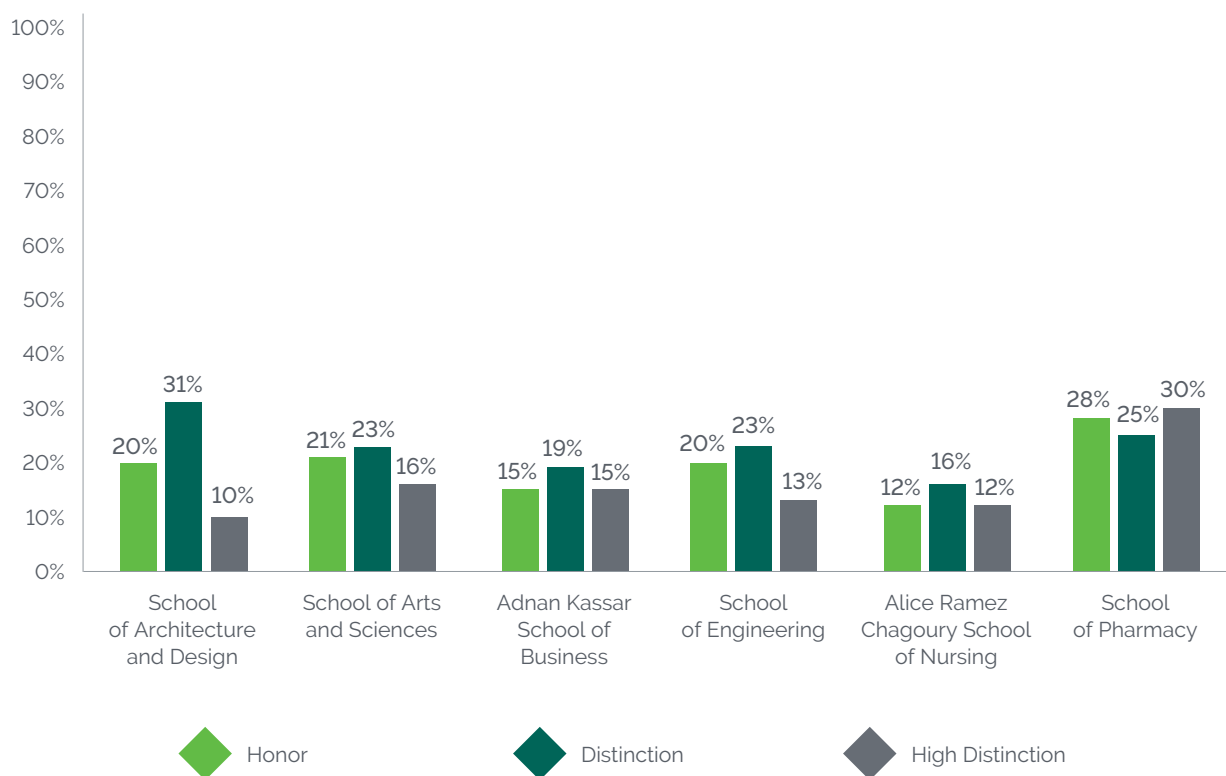

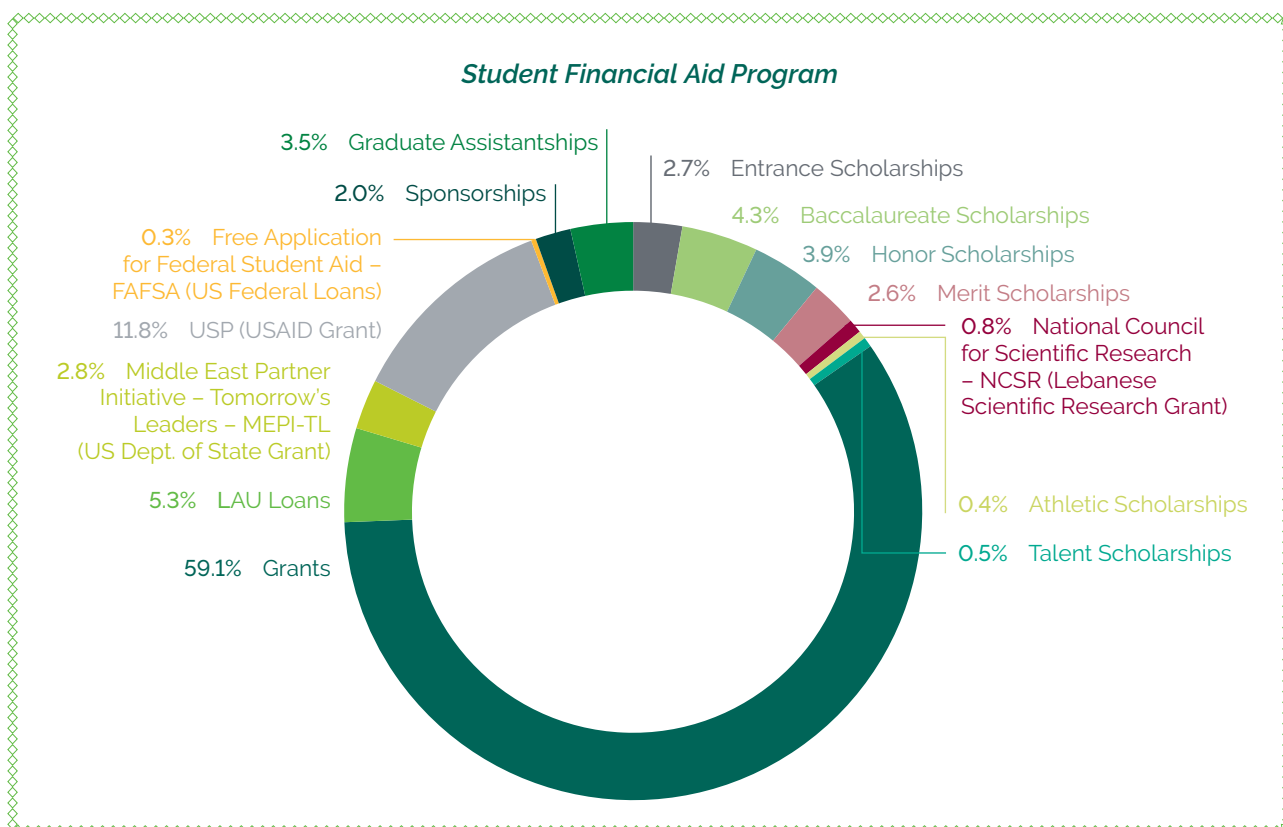

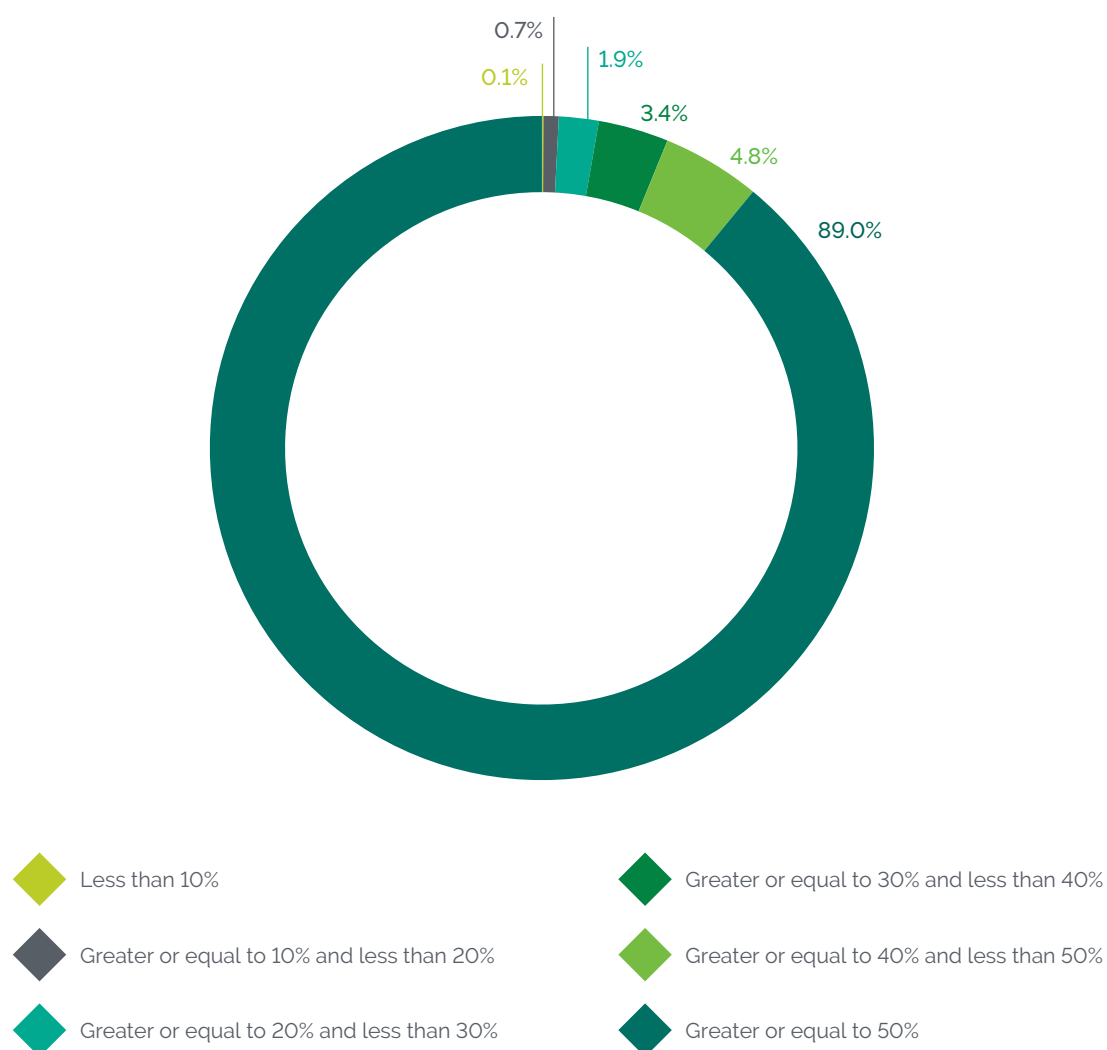

Distribution of Financial Aid Awards

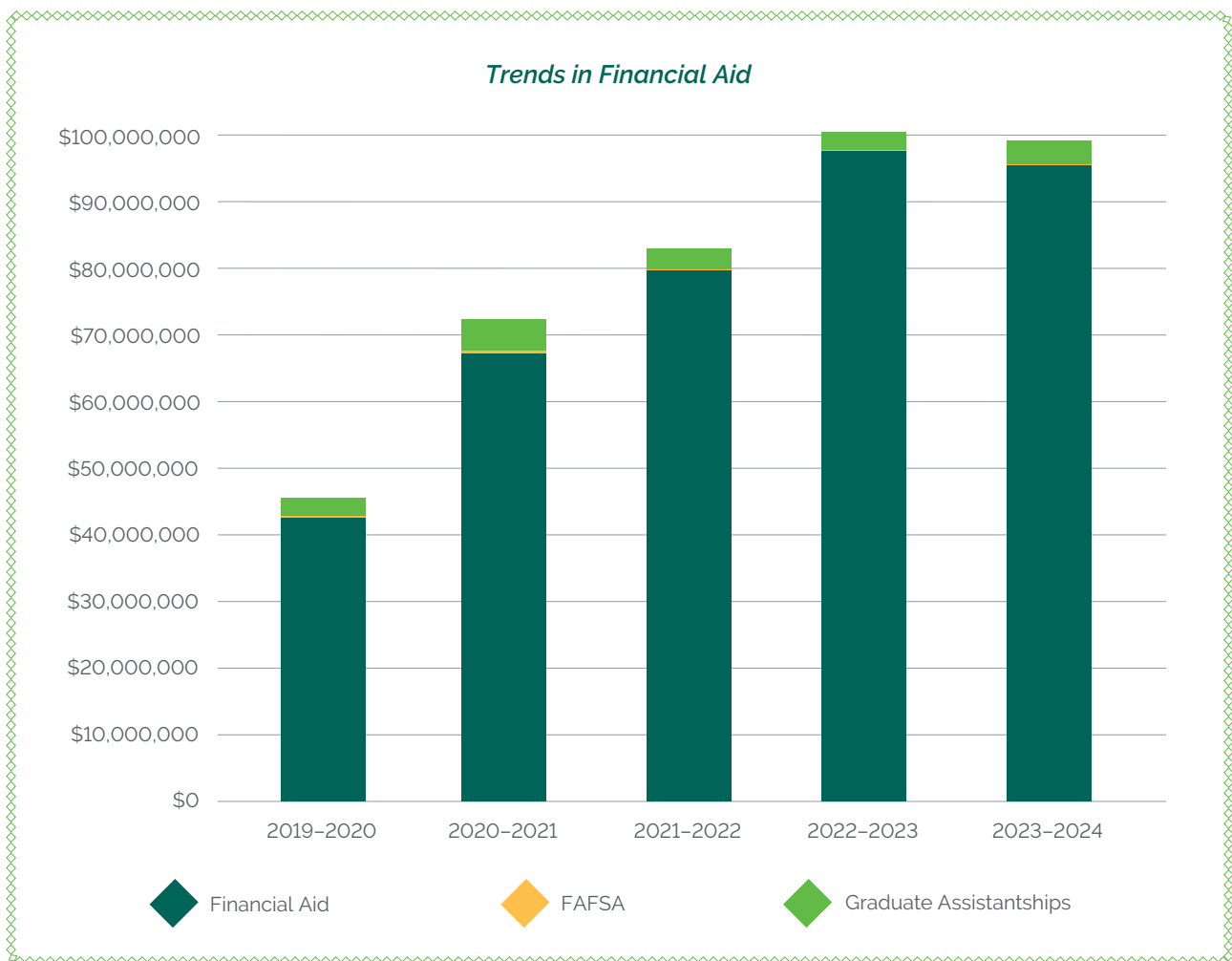

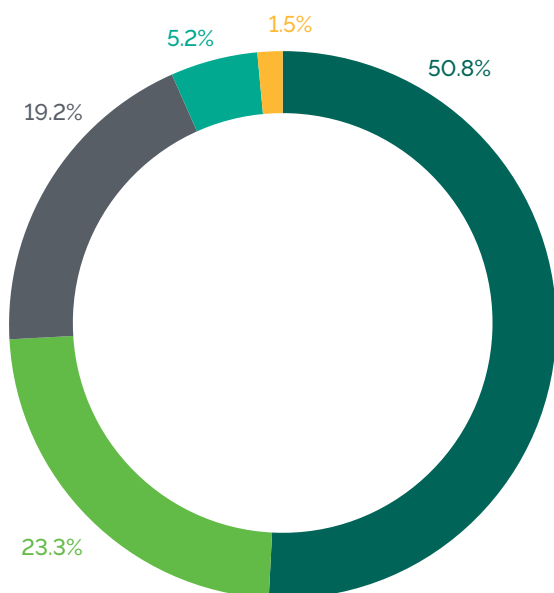

AFFILIATIONS

The LAU Libraries have affiliations with local, regional, and international associations and organizations:

- ◆ The Lebanese Library Association (LLA), since 1995. LLA was founded in Beirut in 1960 "to improve the standard of libraries and librarians and to encourage scientific and literary research in Lebanon."
- ◆ The American Library Association (ALA), since 1985. Founded on October 6, 1876, ALA's mission is "to provide leadership for the development, promotion and improvement of library and information services and the profession of librarianship in order to enhance learning and ensure access to information for all."
- ◆ American International Consortium of Academic Libraries (AMICAL), since 2004. AMICAL is an international consortium of American-model, liberal arts institutions of higher learning. It aims to advance learning, teaching, and research through the collaborative development of library and information services and curricular resources at member institutions.
- ◆ Lebanese Academic Library Consortium (LALC), since 2002. LALC initially encompassed four private institutions: the American University of Beirut (AUB), LAU, Notre-Dame University (NDU), and the University of Balamand (UOB). It has since been joined by the Holy Spirit University of Kaslik (USEK), University Saint Joseph, Beirut Arab University (BAU), and Haigazian University. At its establishment, LALC was the first library consortium in Lebanon to establish inter-university collaboration in subscriptions to online resources.
- ◆ The Lebanese Interlibrary Loan/Document Delivery Services consortium (LIDS), since 2007. It was established by LAU in collaboration with USEK, NDU, and UOB. It was recently joined by the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia-Commission of Lebanon (ESCWA), Haigazian University, Middle East University, BAU, AUB, and the Central Bank of Lebanon.
- ◆ OCLC, affiliated since 2008, is a worldwide non-profit library service and research organization with memberships from almost 25,900 libraries, archives, and museums in 170 countries. Thanks to a Libraries Very Interested in Sharing (LVIS) agreement signed through OCLC, LAU libraries can now share resources with more than 4,000 libraries around the world for free.

Full-time Faculty by Rank

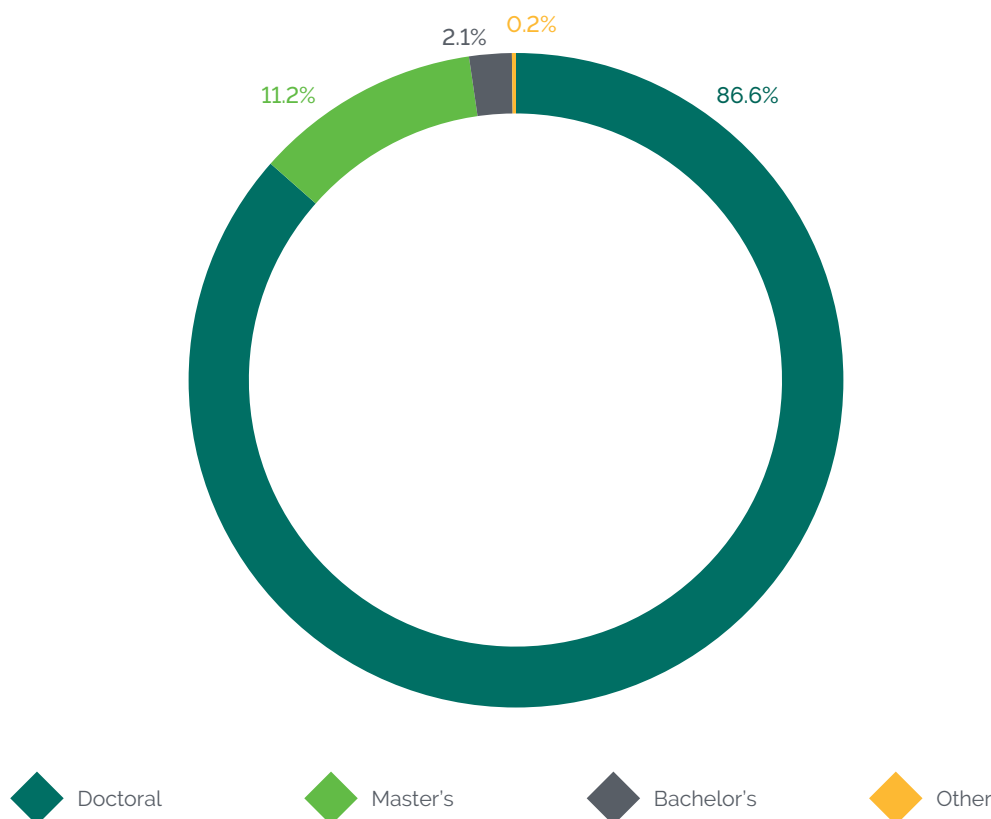

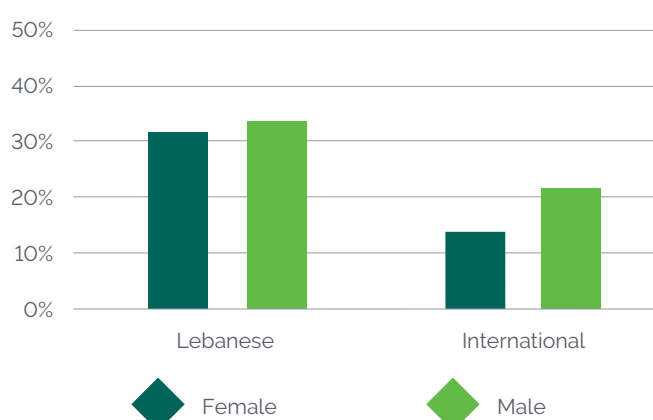

Full-time Faculty by Nationality



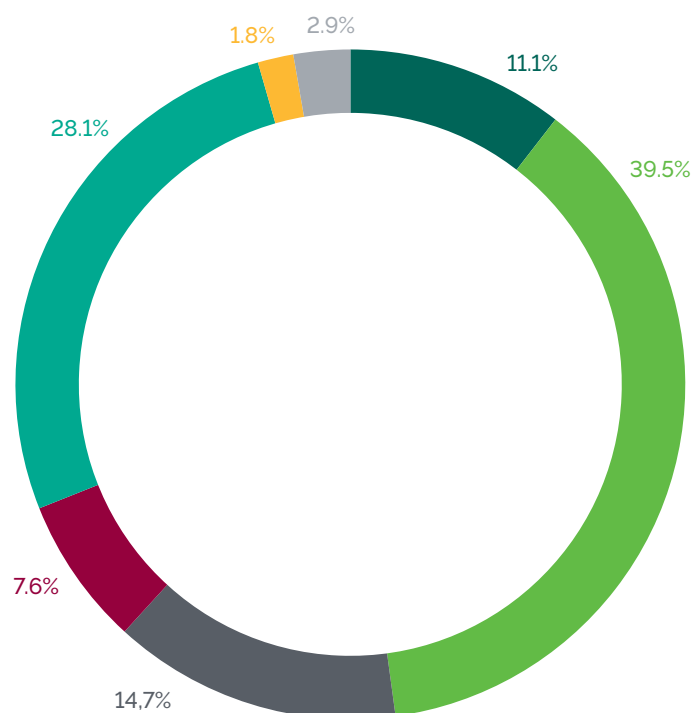

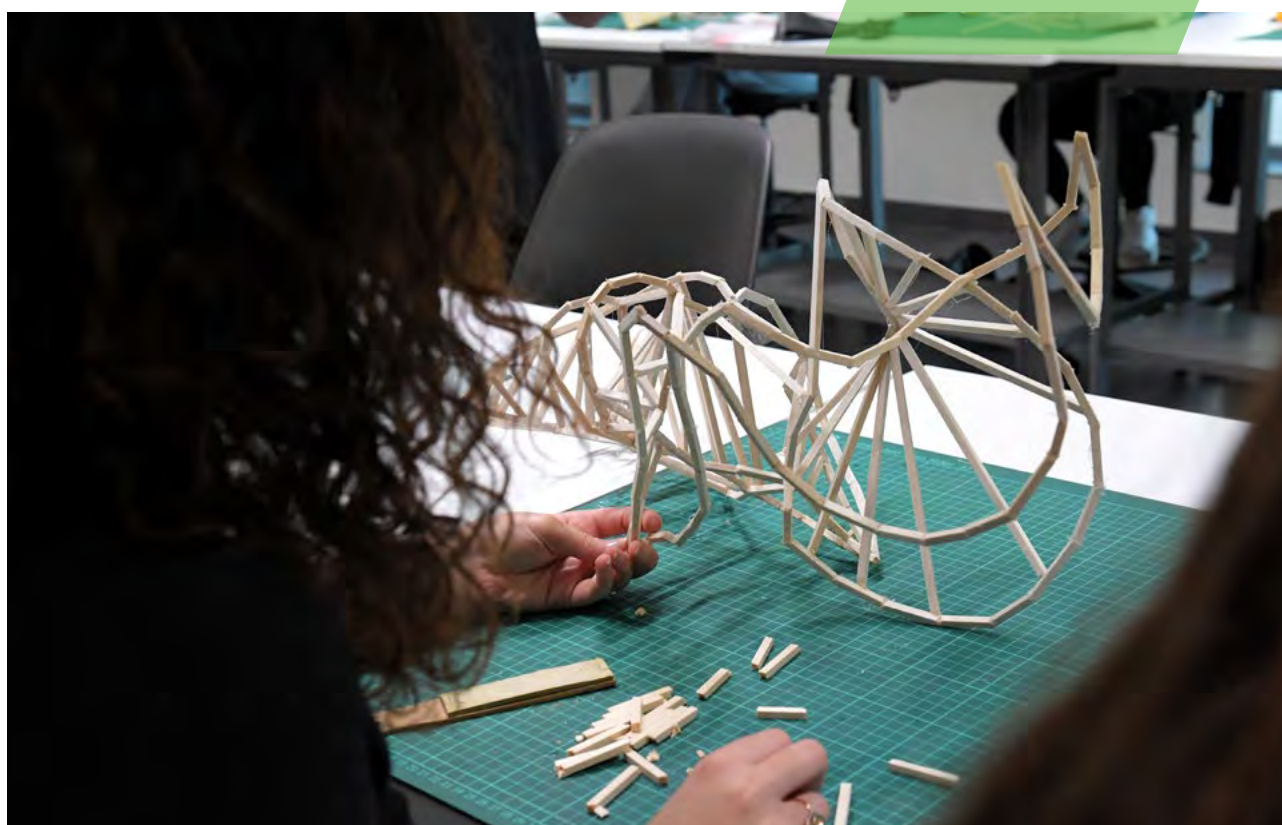

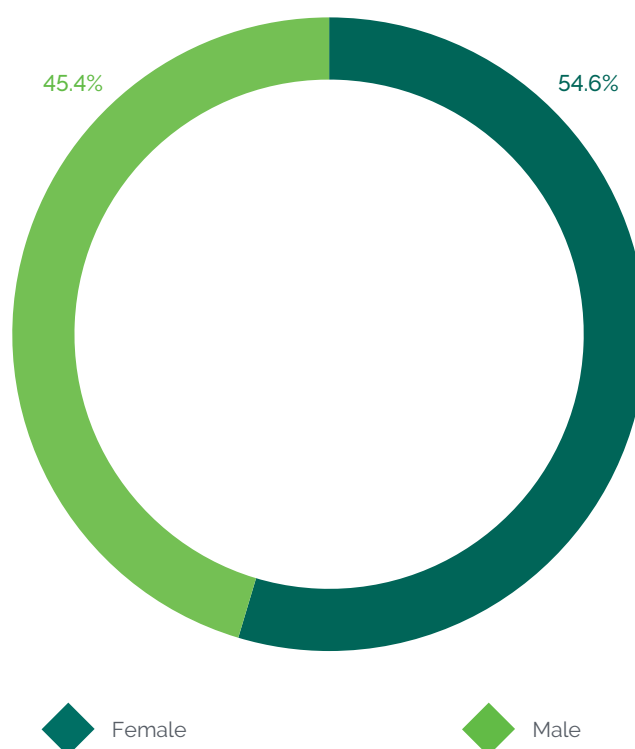

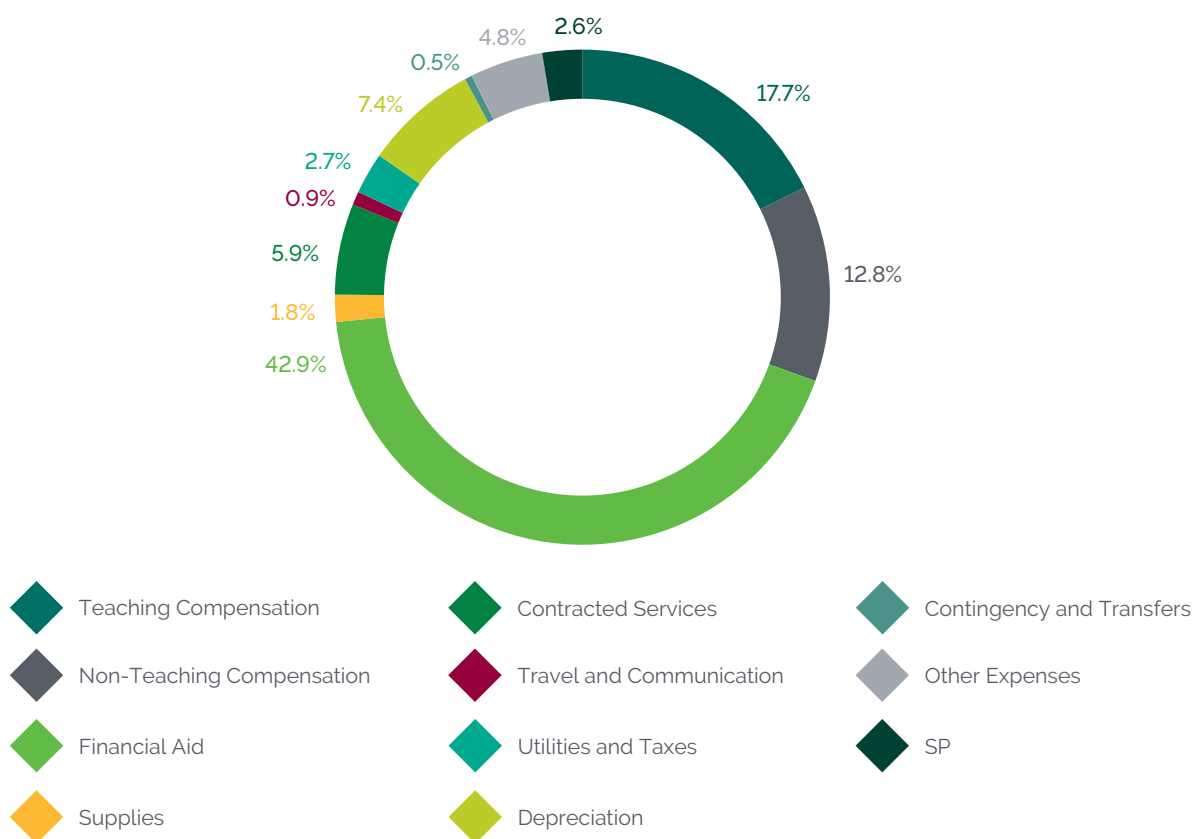

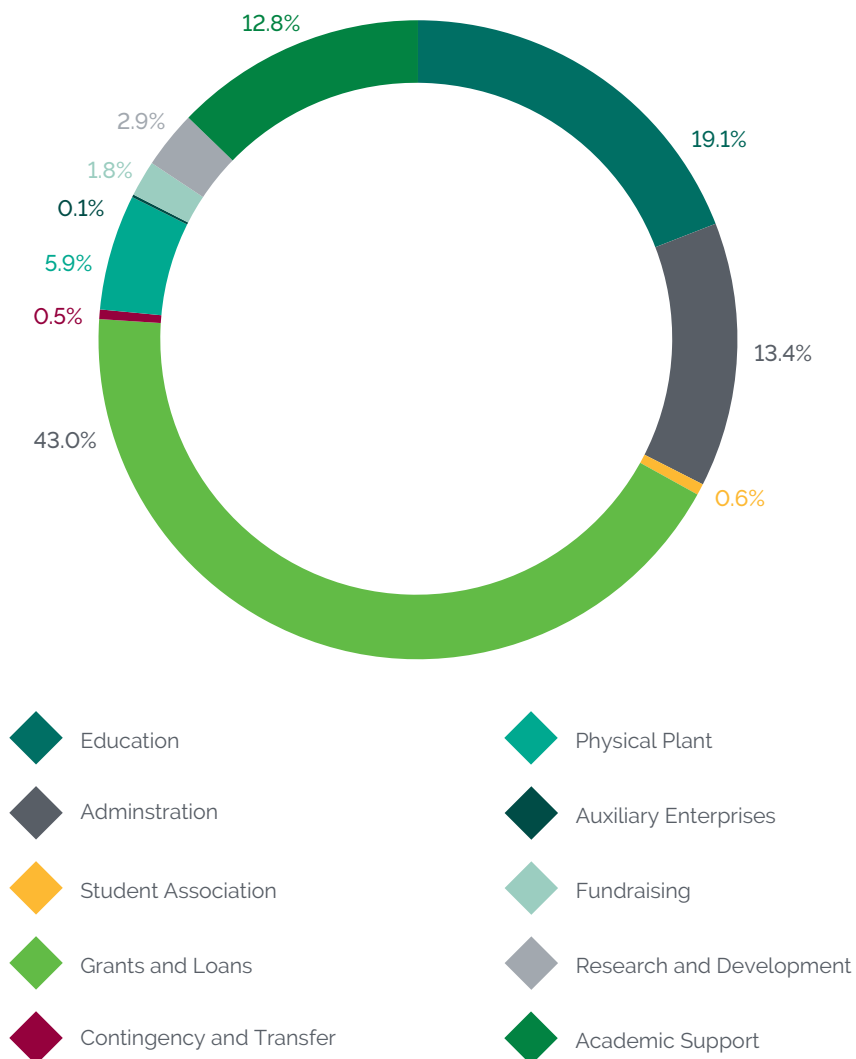

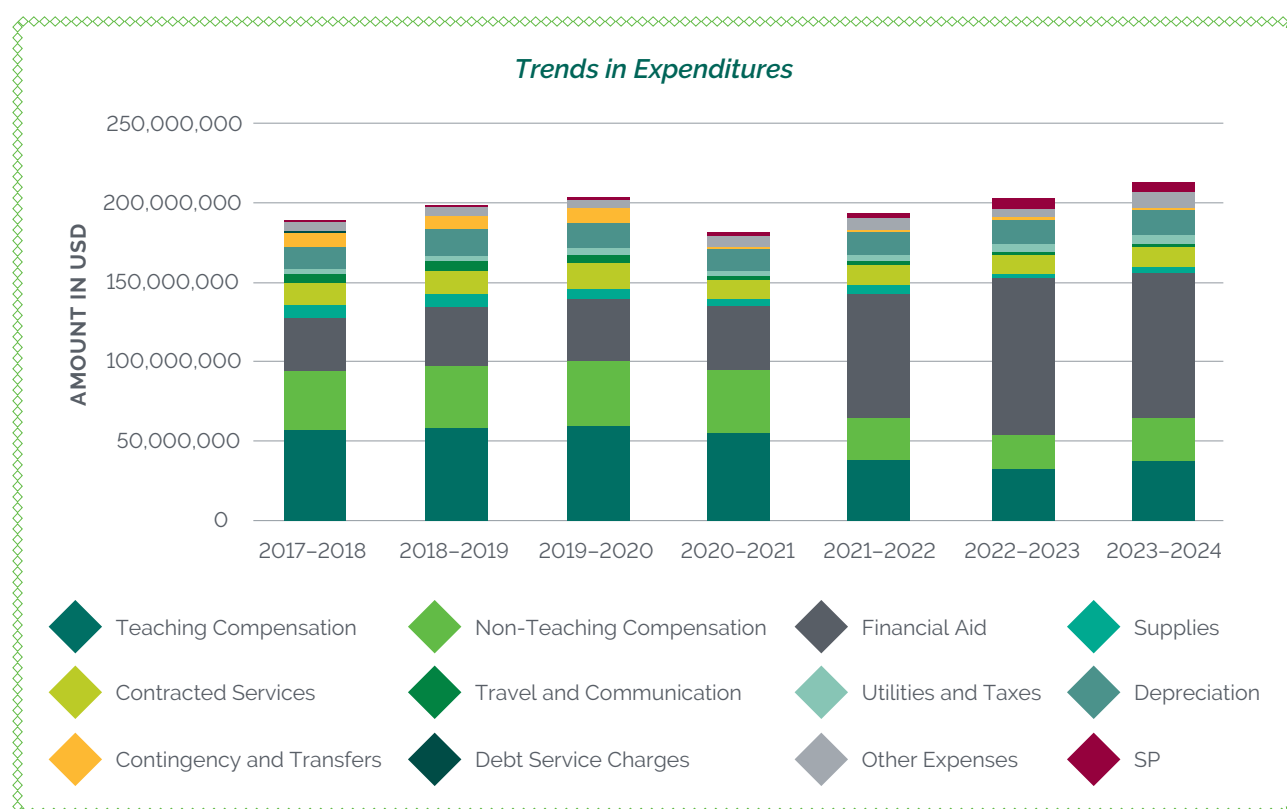

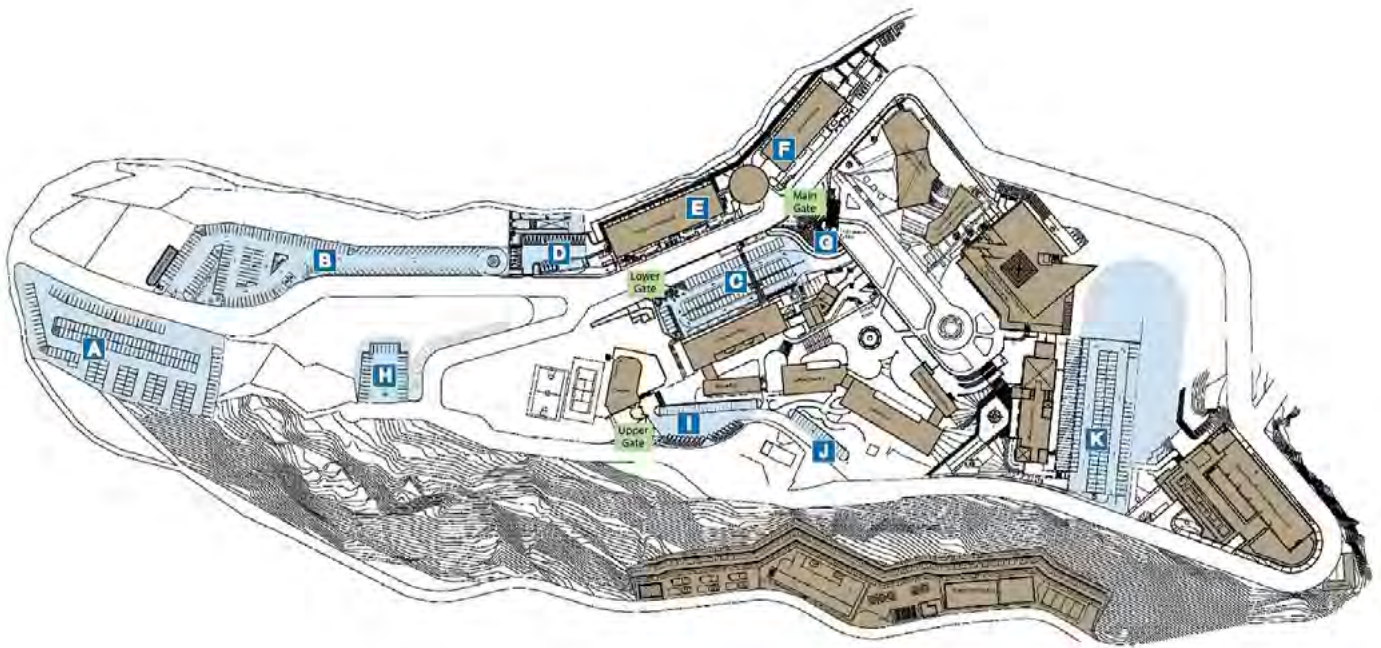
